



1949 DAIMLER DB CONSORT RESURRECTION

PART 80 - INTERIOR TRIM PART 6

I managed to solve the design of the missing piece of trim at the top of the door pillar. It may not be the same as the original, but it performs the same function. This piece of trim has the twin functions of covering the door pillar and providing a backing support for the door rubbers.

I have used sheet metal as the base of the cover to provide the necessary strength in supporting the door rubbers with timber strips on each side. The two top bolts securing the vinyl trim piece hold it firmly against the pillar. At this stage I have not decided whether I will cover them with cloth or vinyl.

The front door cards are next in line for attention and in this case, I only have the remnants of the driver's door card to use as the basis for the new ones. These doors are much larger than the rear, and the hole in the timber under the door pocket is huge. The process of creating new card is basically the same as the rear – shape the timber and finalise the fixing points on the door frame.

The only difference is that extra care needs to be taken when covering the timber with the vinyl. You are dealing with a much larger piece of vinyl with a big hole in the middle, and it tends to creep out of alignment as it is tacked and glued. The shape of the pocket is a little different to cater for the placement of an adjustable arm rest. I am certain that I have the arm rests somewhere, I will have to check through my parts storage.

I have decided not to use the elastic in the old door card and have ordered new cord for the top of the pocket.


VICTORIAN CLUB'S DISPLAY DAY 28TH MAY

Sadly, the later scheduled date proved to be quite damp, but not that wet as to prevent some vehicles from braving the conditions to be on Display.

Where to start. What a treat we had, so many highlights and wonderful experiences with a great group of Daimlerites.

Well guess I better start at the beginning. We had sixteen lucky participants who joined the tour. Coming from various parts of the country meant that most of us met up at the Siesta Motor Inn in Albury for the dash to Tasmania. Yes, that is the one that advertises in our magazine. It is a great place to stay. As we rolled up in the afternoon we gathered for our customary drinks and nibbles outside the pool house before an excellent dinner in the restaurant. That set the mood for the rest of our trip. We had our leader, John Hiscox and his son Graham, daughter Amanda and husband Marcus Sykes, Kevin and Liz Wilkinson and Ian and Karen Brenner, my sister Pamela, and I. The next morning, we headed off to Geelong to board the evening ferry, where we were met by Richard and Wendy Bowen and Richard and Dilber Thwaites. Our last two participants, Helen and John Stewart were flying in and meeting us in Davenport. Helen is the sister of Karen so we had three sets of siblings.

The ferry was late getting into Geelong and we were delayed in our boarding.

We disembarked the following morning to circumnavigate Tasmania anti clockwise. The idea being that we would travel at our own pace, following the comprehensive itinerary put together by John, aided by Amanda meeting up along the way. This would not only allow participants to tailor their timed visits to their interests but also fitness and mobility levels.

This enhanced the experience for us all. Unfortunately, we had no Daimler's so had to make do with several moderns and not so moderns as well as a couple of old Rolls'.s

The scenery is breathtaking. I felt like I was touring around in an episode of 'Doc Martin'.

The whole place felt as if time had stood still some time in the 60s. There are so many highlights, that to do them justice would take pages and pages, so will not try.

Stanley was our first port of call. I climbed the nut which while challenging was well worth it.

The views are stunning. We descended via the cable car.

Travelled through forests so dense with ancient trees that it is hard to believe that there are no populations of thylacines left.

Beautiful waterfalls, ride on the heritage wilderness steam rack railway from Queenstown, forest walks. Wonderful cruise from Strahan to 'Hells Gate' the mouth of magnificent Macquarie Harbour then tours of the historic Sarah Island penal colony, famous for its shipbuilding and extreme torture.

Then we cruised up the pristine Gordon River disembarking for walks in this ancient untouched forest. Returning to Strahan and play "the ship that never was" the 1834 tale of the last ship built on Sarah Island and the dramatic convict escape.

What I like so much on these adventures is spending a couple of weeks with the group, gives you the opportunity to get to know the others over great food a few wines and a few tales. I guess, an upmarket campfire experience. Another highlight was the 'Wall in the Wilderness' an artwork in Huon pine by sculptor Greg Duncan, housed in an architecturally stunning gallery. The Tahune Tree Walk was exiting but a bit scarry as you are way up in the treetops and can feel the whole structure moving. To say nothing of the cable bridge crossings.

The next stop on our tour was Cradle Mountain National Park were we also stayed. Walked part of the overland track and past Dove Lake. It snowed on part of that hike. You can see why this is a world

heritage area. So many stunning views. Had a nice chat with a wombat.

Despite our enthusiasm he showed no interest in us.

Then to Hobart and all its attractions, our digs were on the Derwent River opposite Mona.

Had a lovely day on Bruny Island, words cannot do justice to the beauty of this place. Spent the day exploring and partaking of the fantastic produce. Visited Salamanca Markets. Probably the best markets in Australia. Drove up to the summit of Mount Wellington. Amazing views and biting winds.

Then a visit to Port Arthur. Unfortunately for me I took ill on the way and had to return to our hotel and seek medical attention. Was out of action and confined to my room for the next five days. The others continued to explore the wonders and beauty of the East Coast.

It is when you are down that you realise how wonderful the people that I was traveling with are.

All sorts of offers of help and support and taking care of me and my car that had the front passenger side window stuck down leaving the car insecure and open to the elements. No problems for these wonderful guys, they got together and worked out how to fix it.

I rallied for the trip back north to Davenport. Again, some beautiful attractions on the way north. A farewell dinner before boarding the ferry. Now home with priceless memories.







AUSTRALIAN BUILT CARRIAGE USED IN CORONATION

Article reprinted from an ABC News article dated 10th April 2023

The King and Camilla were taken from Buckingham Palace to the Abbey in the Diamond Jubilee State Coach, built to commemorate Elizabeth's 60th year on the throne and first used in 2014.

It was built in Sydney by W J Frecklington, at the time only the second royal carriage constructed in a century.

Mr Frecklington also built Queen Elizabeth's Australian State Coach, which was given to her during the Australian Bicentennial in 1988.

The carriage, which has been referred to as a "living time capsule" by royal experts, is topped by a piece of oak from Lord Nelson's HMS Victory, carved into a golden crown.

The air-conditioned interior was carved using wood from multiple ships, castles and cathedrals including the Tower of London, Edinburgh Castle, Balmoral Castle, the Royal Pavilion, Windsor Castle, the Mayflower and others.

Its two door handles, made in New Zealand, are decorated ech with 24 diamonds and 130 sapphires.

Also included are fragments of Sir Isaac Newton's apple tree, wood from the door of 10 Downing Street and metal from a musketball from the Battle of Waterloo.

I was surprised to read in the NSW Government blurb I found on line that National Motoring Heritage Day had been going for over 20 years. For many of those years, when we (and our cars) were younger and we were stouter of limb we would put on quite a good attendance at various locations, I particularly recall Fagan Park and Chevalier College.

Last year, post covid John and Eve Hiscox and I represented the Club at East Richmond. This year the Club decided on visiting Berry for the Display being held at the Berry Showground. Berry township has always been a popular spot to stop, for Sydneysiders with great shops and food outlets, but is a clear 2 ½ hour drive south from home for me and even more for John from his home at Wheeler Heights.

Happily Graham McDonald expressed interest and that spurred me on and so two Special Sports made their way south early in the morning to be at the Berry Showground by the requested time of 8.30 a.m.

The alarm went off at 5.00 a.m. and I stumbled around for a while before getting to a sufficient level of consciousness to maneuver the Special Sports out on to the street by 5.50 a.m. I must add at this point that I had taken the car out the previous day to fill up both the fuel tank (with fuel) and the tyres (with air) but the air thingy was out of order at the local servo and so I thought I'd stop at one opposite Rushcutters Bay on my way the next morning. As a precaution I did pump up the tyres a bit with a foot pump I retrieved from the boot of the DE (it was the only one out of three I had in the garage that worked). Of course, when I stopped at Rushcutters Bay and asked where the air thingy was I was greeted with a stupid look and a response of "we don't have any" by the attendant in the shop. My retort of "Don't people have air in their tyres any more?" was greeted with a quiet suggestion that Woolloomooloo was the closest service station and try there, stupid look continuing.

So at exactly 6.19 a.m whilst removing the nearside rear spat to access the tyre valve (yes there is always at least one that needs to be removed) at Woolloomooloo I was able to reply to Graham's text that they were on their way in like terms.

The run down was very pleasant, traffic was minimal in the city and as the sun rose and I found myself on the road south past Blakehurst and I could turn the headlights off, I sat very relaxed and drove down at a good clip (for a Special Sports), being passed by more and more historic vehicles south of Audley McDonalds where a number had been meeting as I drove past including a fine Riley RMS and (I am happy to say it was heavily modified) a Morris Minor.

I arrived at exactly 8.35 a.m. and was in place next to Graham's splendid Special Sports at the appointed time.

Graham was there with his son Brent and we chatted for a while before the cold wind dropped a little and we wandered around the field looking at the many and varied cars on exhibit. It was a very wide range of cars, from what we might see at an All British to Hot Rods, modified vehicles, modern vehicles, some stationery

engines and of course other elderly vehicles including some American, Italian (a fine twenties/early thirties Alfa Romeo saloon was a stand out) a couple of amazing Rolls Royce Silver Ghosts or Phantoms and post war Rolls Royce's and Bentleys, Jaguars and other makes.

All in all an interesting display of well over 200 cars, many from local Car Clubs which was nice to see and all driven there, some (like ours) having driven from Sydney covering well over 100 miles in the early morning.

We met a local Majestic Major owner, Ian Nicholls, which was a bonus and I hope to welcome Ian to some club events soon.

I took the opportunity of having parked near an exit point to sneak off before lunch (sorry to have missed Jim Gellett who visited) but I joked with Graham that given the attention his car had received, he had to stay around for the prize giving as he would be in the winning circle for sure and guess what? I was right (for once) and Graham's car won Runner Up for Best Vehicle of the Era from the period 1930 – 1959. A really lovely (and very well earned) recognition of the magnificent job Graham has done on resurrecting and restoring the ex Terry Lloyd car that Graham acquired from Terry's Estate some years ago.

The car is a real credit to Graham's hard work (he thanks Covid for having the time to do the work during lock down and the car for giving him something to do during that time).

I can advise that Graham and Brent also returned home without incident, testament to the fine condition of his car and the reliability that seems to be a feature of these great long legged (if not speedy) Daimlers with unstressed overdrive gearboxes.

As an aside, I have inadvertently discovered the way to increase the speed of my car, the speedo is running at least 10% fast!!! Must have been that Penetrol I squirted into the speedo cable run on the day before the trip.

15th MARCH FRIDAY ITINERARY

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
DB18/CONSORT PARTS FOR SALE
